

Incisional Care Recommendations

Types of skin closure:

- More common closures:
 - Dissolvable Staples
 - Prineo/Dermabond: This dressing is good for 2 weeks. Patient to remove at home after
 2 weeks. Sometimes, it is easier to remove with Vaseline.
 - Silver dressing: Patient to remove at home on day 5.
- Less common closures:
 - Non Dissolvable Steel Staples: If present, patient needs to make appointment to have the staples removed on day 3-7.
 - Surgical Glue
 - Sutures

Steri-Strips:

- You can wash or shower with Steri-Strips in place.
- Clean the area by allowing soap and water to gently run over the incision site.
- Gently pat the area dry and then leave incision open to air.
- An unscented panty liner may be placed in the skin fold to absorb excessive moisture or drainage.
- Do not pull, tug or rub Steri-Strips. If you notice that the steri-strips start to curl prior to 7 days from the day of surgery, please remove them.
- The Steri-Strips will often times fall off within 7 days from the day of surgery. If they have not fallen off within 7 days, please get the steri-strips wet in the shower and peel them off.

To reduce your risk of infection:

- Always wash your hands before and after touching your incision(s).
- Avoid picking at staples, tissue glue, or stitches.
- Keep your incisions dry (make sure the incision sites have been patted dry after washing).
- Do not apply any lotions or creams to the healing incision(s).

What to watch out for:

- The incision splits open.
- There is increased pain along with redness and warmth around the incision.
- There is continuous bloody or yellowish drainage from the incision.
- There is a foul odor
- Any fever over 100 degrees or flu-like symptoms, associated with muscular aching, chills, headaches, or general feeling of ill health.
